THE SPACE: The main level of the 4,000-squarefoot house has an open floor plan, which includes a living room, a dining room, a family room and a kitchen.

THE GOAL: Soften the modern feel of the house by introducing traditional furniture and fabrics with a mix of custom organic pieces.

Barbara's tips on softening a modern space

- 1. Don't skimp on fabrics. Choose rich fabrics with great textures and introduce a pattern as an accent.
- 2. Look for older rugs with a traditional pattern that have unique colors-Turkish Oushaks are my favorite.
- 3. Choose a few exceptional accessories instead of just trying to fill in a space with accessories that have no meaning.
- 4. Don't be afraid to play with color.
- 5. Be true to the architecture by using some pieces with clean lines, but mix in different shapes. The round dining table was a great change for this space.
